#### **Use a Variety of Titles Within Your Content**

You can't always anticipate the words someone will use to search for a position. While you might call a role "Production Line Worker", your candidate might be searching, "Factory Production Worker". They won't intuitively know what you call your specific roles. That's why it's important to incorporate variations of a title on the individual position pages.

#### **Create Content Outside of Careers Pages**

You'll notice that there are some keywords listed above that won't naturally appear in a Careers page or individual position page. For example: "Best Manufacturing Jobs." When it comes to terms like this, we recommend creating blog content to help answer these questions. This is an excellent way to capture the attention of curious candidates and answer their most pressing questions.

### **Make it Regional Specific**

As you promote positions, be sure to include regional details such as city, state, etc. Make queries specific to your audience's location. e.g. "Manufacturing Production Jobs Near Me."
